ASSOCIATE OF ARTS DEGREE

Transfer to St. Martins University – Criminal Justice (Forensic Sciences Emphasis)

- To transfer to the St. Martins University Criminal Justice Program with an emphasis in Forensic Sciences, students must achieve a cumulative grade point average of 2.25 or greater. St. Martins University will not accept in transfer any class grade less than C- or 1.5 numeric.
- Completion of this degree also fulfills the direct transfer agreement within Washington State. (see reference below)
- This planning guide pertains only to the Criminal Justice Program at St. Martins University and does not necessarily meet requirements for any other Criminal Behavior/Justice Program.
- South Puget Sound Community College requires all students to complete an exit assessment process as a requirement for graduation. This requirement is in effect for the following student populations: all new students as of summer 2003; and those students who do not maintain consecutive enrollment under the pre-existing catalog requirement. This requirement does not apply to students who are seeking a certificate of completion.

DIVERSITY REQUIREMENT

Beginning Summer Quarter 2005, South Puget Sound Community College requires all new students seeking an Associate Degree to complete a "diversity" course which meets the college criteria for listing as a diversity course, and has been approved for such listing by the college Instructional Council prior to the student enrolling in the class. This requirement will be in effect for the following student populations: all new students as of summer 2005, and those students who do not maintain consecutive enrollment under the pre-existing catalog. This course requirement does not apply to students applying for a certificate of completion.

Transferability of Credits:

Direct Transfer Agreement (DTA) South Puget Sound Community College has direct transfer agreements with most Washington State four-year colleges/universities. This means that students who earn an Associate of Arts degree from South Puget Sound Community College:

- will enter the four-year institution with junior standing;
- will have satisfied all or most of the specific general education, core, distribution, or breadth requirements of that college;
- may not be required to meet the same admissions standards as entering freshmen,

however, every college/university decides what credits it will accept from South Puget Sound Community College. Since many schools have requirements that differ within the same disciplines, students are encouraged to contact an advisor at the four-year college or university of their choice prior to completing the associate degree.

Please note: The direct transfer agreement assures the transfer of credits, but not automatic admission into the department or program of your choice.

Grade point average: A minimum cumulative GPA of 2.0 is required to complete the DTA.

Resident credits requirement: At least 15 credits must be earned through completion of South Puget Sound Community College courses.

Students who plan to transfer to a four-year college or university with a major in science may wish to earn the **Associate of Science** degree.
